## A Unique Duet...

Music lovers will have the opportunity to attend two exceptional fundraising concerts this spring. The first, on May 5th, will be the unlikely combination of violin and percussion with Denise Dillenbeck and Mark Goodenberger as they pair up in DuoDG.

What can you expect from this artistic combination? You can expect a pairing of music that you have never experienced before; marimba, vibraphone, and percussion instruments combined with the rhythmic possibilities of the violin.

Goodenberger, prolific composer and director of percussion studies at Central Washington University has written extensively, especially for

dramatic contrast of instruments with colorful soundscapes and evocative melodies.

Dillenbeck will be a familiar face to those who attended Bach Fest in 2012. As soloist in *Scheherazade* and a co-concert master, she brought to Bach Fest a professionalism and artistry that was appreciated by the Bach Fest community. The May 5th concert will be in Manson, 2 PM at the home of Betty and Dave Pettit. Tickets are \$40.00, which includes refreshments.

# Daniel Baldwin, Musical and Artistic Director

As I glance out my backdoor on the Monday before Easter 2013, the last Monday in March, I remember that by this time last year, we in northern Iowa, had enjoyed ten March days on which the temperature had reached 70 degrees (or higher). In fact we had three days above 80. Today, however, is a different story. Today as I look out my backdoor I see 20 inches of snow on the ground (I assume the ground is still there--we haven't actually seen it since the week before Christmas). Our temperature on the very first day of spring (last Wednesday) ranged from a low of +3 to a high of +18. So when I say I'm looking forward to July and the start of our 32nd season of music at the lake, you need not doubt it.

This summer's musical lineup includes some of my very favorite pieces; pieces like:

**Overture to *I Vespri Siciliani*, by Giuseppe Verdi.** Not one of Verdi's greatest or best-known operas. Without question one of his most beautiful, most powerful overtures.

**Mendelssohn's Violin Concerto in E minor.** It is one of a handful of pieces I would call perfect. Not just beautiful, or sublime, or transcendent--the Mendelssohn Violin Concerto is perfect. Our soloist will be Bach Fest concertmaster **Denise Dillenbeck**. Don't miss this opportunity to hear what many consider to be **the** greatest violin concerto played by an extraordinary artist.

**Bach's Cantata 180, *Schmücke dich, o liebe Seele* ("Adorn yourself, O dear soul").**

Sebastian Bach's 200+ cantatas (secular and sacred) remain as one of the most astonishing intellectual and artistic achievements of Western civilization. Dozens of these pieces were lost in the years immediately after the composer's death: some scholars believe the actual number of cantatas written by Bach to be greater than 400.

**Selections from *Porgy and Bess*, by George Gershwin.** American opera at its finest. I can almost guarantee you'll drive home after the concert singing one of Gershwin's love songs.


**More Mendelssohn: "Nocturne" and "Wedding March," from incidental music to *A Midsummer Night's Dream*.**

Felix Mendelssohn wrote the *Midsummer* overture at 17 years of age; the incidental music he composed in 1842, at the ripe old age of 33. By the way, Felix Mendelssohn played a key role in the early-19th century rediscovery of the music of Sebastian Bach. In 1829, at the age of 20, Mendelssohn organized and conducted a performance of Bach's *St. Matthew Passion* in Berlin. The success of this performance, the first since Bach's death in 1750, played an essential role in the re-examination and revival of Bach's music in Germany, and eventually, throughout Europe. Throw in some highlights from *My Fair Lady* and *West Side Story*, a Brandenburg concerto, and a rowdy march by Berlioz, and I would say we all have a lot of beautiful, live music to look forward to in July.
