Swine Flu Update

University Health Services has had several questions about the Swine Flu. In response to these questions Dr. Julia Spinolo, director of University Health Services and assistant professor of Nursing, has prepared the following information...

Even though there has been just one confirmed case of the Swine Flu in Georgia (and that of someone from Kentucky who was visiting the state), the Acting Health and Human Services Secretary has declared a Public Health Emergency nationwide involving Swine Influenza A.

The symptoms of swine flu in people are expected to be similar to the symptoms of regular human seasonal influenza and include:

- Fever
- Lethargy
- Lack of appetite
- Coughing.

Some people with swine flu also have also reported:

- Runny nose
- Sore throat
- Nausea
- Vomiting
- Diarrhea

Remember these everyday actions to stay healthy.

- Cover your nose and mouth with a tissue when you cough or sneeze. Throw the tissue in the trash after you use it.

- If you don't have a tissue available, cough or sneeze into your upper sleeve or elbow, not your hands.
- Wash your hands often with soap and water. Alcohol-based hands cleaners are also effective.
- Avoid touching your eyes, nose or mouth at any time. Germs spread that way.

Try to avoid close contact with sick people.

- Influenza is thought to spread mainly person-to-person through coughing or sneezing of infected people. (Editor's Note: Despite the name, Swine Flu is not spread through food products like pork or bacon. In fact, the pork-producing industry is trying to have the name changed to Hybrid Flu, to dispel this misconception.)
- If you get sick, stay home from work or school and limit contact with others to keep from infecting them.

Governor's Statement Regarding the First H1N1 Flu Case in Georgia

Governor Sonny Perdue issued the following statement today regarding the first H1N1 flu case in Georgia being confirmed by the Centers for Disease Control:

"Today's confirmed case of the H1N1 flu in Georgia is a reason for precaution, not panic. I want to stress that it is an isolated case appearing in a woman visiting our state for an event who had also recently traveled to Mexico. The State of Georgia has worked diligently over the past several years to prepare for a situation like this, and we are partnering with local and federal officials to respond appropriately. I encourage Georgians to follow the advice of public health professionals and take the recommended precautions to protect themselves and their families. At this stage, the simplest things, like washing hands and using disinfectants, can be the most effective safeguards. I am confident in our planning and preparation and our ability to respond over the coming days."

Spivey Hall's annual Spring Bach Festival will conclude this weekend with performances by organist Vincent Dubois, cellist Daniel Müller-Schott, and pianist Angela Hewitt.

No Spivey Hall Bach Festival could be complete without an organ recital. The three-manual, 77-rank, 4,413-pipe Albert Schweitzer Memorial Organ built by Fratelli Ruffatti of Padua, Italy, will resound gloriously when French organist Vincent Dubois returns to Spivey Hall at 3 p.m. on Saturday, May 2 for a program of works by Bach and other composers. Dubois' visit to the campus of Clayton State University will include a pre concert talk at 2 p.m.

Clayton State to Honor Starr, Lee at Spring Graduation, May 9

Clayton State University has undergone many changes in the past nine years. On Saturday, May 9, the graduating class of spring 2009 will be present at another significant moment in the history of the University... the final Clayton State Commencement Ceremony for President Dr. Thomas K. Harden.

The University's dual spring commencement ceremonies will be held in the Athletics & Fitness Center. The first ceremony will be held at 9 a.m., the second starts at noon. Graduates of the College of Arts & Sciences will receive their diplomas at the noon ceremony, while graduates of the University's other four schools – Business, Nursing, Information & Mathematical Sciences, and Professional Studies -- will take part in the 9 a.m. ceremony. A total of 628 students will be graduating, including 32 students receiving master's degrees.

The University will be honoring the late State Senator Terrell Starr and retired State Representative William "Bill" Lee with honorary doctoral degrees. Senator Starr's degree will be presented posthumously to his children, Terry Starr and JoAnn McJenkin.

LaJuan Simpson to Speak at Fayette County Library, May 19

Dr. LaJuan Simpson has been invited to serve as a speaker at the Fayette County Library on Tuesday, May 19.

The Library is preparing to begin several months' worth of activities in conjunction with its second annual "Fayette on the Page," a countywide "One Book, One Community" initiative, in partnership with Clayton State -- Fayette. The book the Library wants to get everybody in Fayette County reading and talking about this year is "A Lesson Before Dying," by Ernest J. Gaines.

Simpson is a recognized expert on Gaines's work, and thus is the first choice for speaker at our "Fayette on the Page" kickoff event on the evening of Tuesday, May 19. That date is also the first screening in the Library's Ernest Gaines Film Festival. Showing will be "The Autobiography of Miss Jane Pittman" in May; "The Sky is Gray" in June; "A Gathering of Old Men" in July; and "A Lesson Before Dying" in August.

The culminating event for "Fayette on the Page" will be a virtual appearance by Gaines at the Fayette County Library via live video teleconference, free and open to the public, on Thursday, Sept. 10, 2009.

Bids posted by Clayton State, not on State contract:

- ◆ May 5, 2009- Last bid opening date for FY09 purchases.

Purchase Requisitions Submitted to Procurement Services:

- ◆ May 15, 2009-All purchases requiring a purchase order.
 - Anything requested after this date must be approved by Budget & Finance.
- ◆ May 22, 2009-No change orders to PO's after this date.

P-Card Cutoff Dates:

- ◆ May 08, 2009- Last day to use the p-card so that the purchase will be charged on the June 15, 2009 Visa statement. You may NOT use your P-Card between May 9 and June 15.

Budget Amendment Requests:

- ◆ May 01, 2009- All budget amendments for FY 2009 submitted to Scott McElroy.

Check Request and Travel Reimbursement Deadlines:

- ◆ June 19, 2009- Last day for all travel related requests for FY 2009 submitted to Procurement Services.
- ◆ June 19, 2009- Last day for all check requests for FY 2009 submitted to Procurement Services.
- ◆ June 26, 2009- All checks to be processed for FY 2009.
